Writing in unbiased language can be an adjustment, it is an important part of to write in an academic tone within your discipline. Use online dictionaries and area's style guide (e.g. APA, MLA, or Chicago) to help identify and choose. After you have finished a draft of your paper, you might want to use your word "find" editing function to identify any "biased" terms you may have missed.
